



Nuns craft harpsichord from kit



For more than four years the halls of Mundelein College's music department have rung with the sounds of hammer, drill and saw, as well as the strains of Bach, as two nuns handcrafted a five-octave Flemish concert harpsichord.

"It was just a bundle of sticks when it arrived," said Sister Frances Dolan of the kit that the two bought from a Connecticut dealer.

Actually, when it arrived, the kit was in more order than when the two nuns began construction, said Sister Eliza Kenney, chairperson of the music de-

partment.



"One of the students' boy friends offered to unpack it," she

said. But, sad to say, his enthusiasm for the job led him to untie all the neatly marked bundles and dispense with the labels.

ALONE, THE TWO would-be builders faced a sea of sticks, and the sight was so unnerving that they postponed construction for a year. "We didn't know what was what," said Sister Kenney, a piano instructor. "We were too scared to even start."

As it turned out, when the blueprints called for a threeeighths-of-an-inch-thick strip, the sisters had to measure every piece of wood to find the proper one, they said. "It was just raw wood," one said, and had to be sawed, sanded and trimmed to fit.

But the most tedious job was adjusting—by shaving with a razor—the 180 plastic jacks that pluck the strings of the instrument, which is the Renaissance precursor of the piano. (Piano strings are struck by little hammers, but harpsichord strings are plucked by hooks of different sizes, called jacks.)

The instrument has 180 strings, one sister said. And four holes had to be drilled to hold the pegs for each string—for a total of 720 holes. So far so good, said the sisters, but nowhere in Chicago hardware stores could they find a drill bit small enough for the pegs The problem was solved by Sister Dolan's brother, a tool-and-die maker, who found one.

SISTER KENNEY'S father, a woodworker, told the two that the color they had painted the case was "repulsive" and advised them how to finish it so it had a more natural woodgrain look.

Stretching the strings (taut wires) brought a run on bandages for their cut fingers, they said. "We have our blood in it," said Sister Nolan.

But now the two are close to completing the instrument after years of having to listen to people ask, "Isn't it done yet?" The original kit was bought with money raised through bake sales and donations, but the finished instrument is worth \$5,000 or \$6,000. Wed., September 12, 1979



Harmony at home He makes music a household word

MANY PEOPLE like to have music in their homes. Alexander Leffek went a bit further than most.

Rather than bringing in an album or a piano, Leffek brought the Berwyn Conservatory of Music into his home.

In 1946 the Berwyn music teacher bought the school from its founder, and with Italian violinist Pellegro Pacini transformed the conservatory in terms of location, students, and instruction. "WHEN THE conservatory first started, there was piano, voice, violin, and dramatic arts instruction, but we added all the band and orchestra lessons," Leffek said, beaming with pride. "The school has really grown."

WHEN LEFFEK moved from Chicago to Berwyn 33 years ago, he moved his new conservatory with him. "I wanted to put the school in my home," he said. "It's an atmosphere that's pleasant. A home is conducive to music. It isn't com-Please turn to page 22

mercial. People can even watch TV while waiting for their lessons."

Leffek has seen a lot of changes in those 33 years. Not all have been welcome. The fate of music education hasn't looked good lately, and it's a trend that worries Leffek.

"WITH THE GENERAL decrease in school enrollment, many districts have to cut their funds for music. When this happens, kids lose interest in musical instruments because they have no band or orchestra to play with," he said.

When Leffek began in 1946, he had "35 students." Now he has about 125 students. "That's just an approximate figure," he cautioned. "There are times when we've had more and less. After 9 years we reached a peak of 357."


Of the students he has had, Leffek estimates he has helped 40 move beyond the practice-for-fun stage and into the professional realm.

"MANY HAVE come to me as piano majors," he said. "I've trained them in piano and theory to pass the entrance exams of the school of their choice. I've helped them know their instrument, relate it to other instruments, and give them musical background."


LEFFEK IS proud of his school. He loves to boast that many of his teachers have "concertized around the world," and that he teaches students ages 6 to 75.

"Age doesn't have much bearing on the ability to learn music," he said. "Younger people may be more flexible because they haven't developed all muscles yet, but anyone can take part."

Leffek said that it's more acceptable today for people to start learning music during adulthood. "I even know of one tuba player who started from scratch during middle age," he said. "Today freedom of expression is just easier to come by."



When she started teaching music to preschoolers four years ago, Kathy Lecinski was amazed by the lack of books and materials available for young children.

"I couldn't find any materials that were musically sound," Mrs. Lecinski explained. "A great deal of what was available insulted a child's intelligence."

Encouraged by her fellow teachers in the Buffalo Grove Park Dist. Preschool, Mrs. Lecinski decided to compose her own songs and write an activity book.

Almost two years in the making, the book and music album, entitled "Look At Me," recently were published by the Good Apple educational publishing house.

"IT HAS probably been the nicest musical thing I've done," Mrs. Lecinski said of the book and album. And her musical involvement is extensive.

A wife and the mother of three young boys, Mrs. Lecinski sings and directs two choirs for St. Mary's Parish, teaches music at St. Mary's school and the Buffalo Grove preschool and performs at weddings and funerals. She is a graduate of Northwestern University's school of music.

The fondness she and her family have for music can be found in the living room of their Knollwood Drive home in Buffalo Grove. A harp stands before the window and a grand piano is in another corner, sharing it with a violin.

The older Lecinski boys, ages eight and seven, take Suzuki violin and piano lessons. The youngest, age 4, will start learning the renowned Japanese music method next year.

WHEN HER children were little, Mrs. Lecinski recalls she and her husband often argued over whether the boys should play baseball or play a musical instrument.

"I thought they should do both and they do. They're both very musical children. And baseball and music haven't interfered with each other."

Before her marriage, Mrs. Lecinski performed as Kathy Ann on the Chicago area supper club circuit, including the famous Saber Room. Although she relishes those days, Mrs. Lecinski said she has no ambitions to return to the glow of stagelights.

"I saw my former agent a while ago," she said. "He offered me a professional job on the spot. I turned him down.

"I have reached a different plateau," she explains. The satisfaction once derived from the stage now comes from her local music activities and especially from the book and record album.

"PARENT RESPONSE and teacher response has been overwhelming," she said. St. Mary's bought books for use in its music program and a children's education center in Buffalo Grove reports brisk sales on both book and album, Mrs. Lecinski said.

Despite hearing their mother sing and play the tunes day after day for almost two years, her three boys still enjoy listening to the finished product.

"They listen to it a lot. They get a real kick out of it because St. Mary's purchased a lot. I look at it (as) a gift that I've been able to do the first book," she said.

So much time and effort went into the project that when the publisher called to say it had been accepted, Mrs. Lecinski said she cried.

Mrs. Lecinski is working on a second book and album. She said she may develop a series of musical activity books and albums for children.

"I will continue doing this as long as the quality is there," she adds.




